This resource is nonpartisan and allows voters to look up information about their town, state, and federal races during every major election cycle. We try to be as comprehensive as possible, and by volunteering, you're helping us to reach the goal of covering *every* Maine town.

Every election cycle will follow the same type of schedule when it comes to your Vote411 research. Once election and candidate information becomes available, you're free to research the data about your town(s) and submit them.

# **BEFORE YOU BEGIN:**

Let's begin by marking some important dates and gathering information about your town(s). You can find this information on the town's website. Before you start, we also recommend you look up your town/city or plantation in our <u>municipal</u> <u>spreadsheet</u> to learn more about your local government.

### 1. YOUR TOWN CLERK

Town clerks have several duties, including administering elections. It will be important to know this information in case you need to look up candidates running for local races or have general questions about the election.

<b>STEP TWO:</b> What are the candidate races? We've contacted our town clerk, now let's get everything sorted.
