JUST FIVE DAYS AWAY: FEBRUARY BOOK DISCUSSION THE SOUL of AMERICA

Our February discussion will be about The Soul of America, which has been widely discussed in the media via author interviews (CNN and Comedy Central, for example). The author, John Meacham, is one of our most prominent presidential historians (biographies of Jefferson, Jackson, FDR, Wilson, and H.W. Bush); and he gave the first eulogy at the recent George H.W. Bush funeral. He was interviewed by Judy Woodruff about a variety of issues concerning presidential history, including the role of the press, which is a topic covered extensively in Soul of America. For those who don't have time to read through the entire book, listening to these interviews will be great preparation for joining the February 14th book discussion at the Riverton Branch of the

Portland Public Library (6:30 - 7:30 pm). Plenty of off-street parking is available.

REGISTER NOW FOR THE NEW ENGLAND STATES LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

Dates are set for the weekend of April 5th – 7th. The conference theme is Advancing Civility in a Diverse New England. It will be six states again this year: CT, MA, ME, NH, RI and VT. Maine will host the regional event, with hotel accommodations available at the Hampton Inn in Wells. The conference room is about one mile away at York County Community College. A full agenda, registration, and hotel information is available here. Please register and reserve your hotel rooms soon. Highlights for Saturday include:

- The keynote address by Nancy Thomas, Director of Institute for Democracy and Higher Education, Tufts University. She will discuss what populations did not vote in the 2016 elections. Who are they? Why didn't they vote? What would motivate them to vote? What are the tangible and psychological barriers to voting? What was different in 2018?
- Susan Clark, author of Slow Democracy: Rediscovering Community, <u>Bringing Decision Making Back home</u>, will conduct a Workshop on Communicating Across the Divide: Challenges and Tools.
- A panel of experts and participant breakout sessions will then explore the question: What does diversity look like in New England? The panelists will stimulate our thinking about determinants of diversity such as econonmic inequality, rural/ urban differences, and education or literacy levels — factors that

often combine with the more commonly discussed issues of gender, race, ethnicity, and generational differences, resulting in a complex set of diversity factors that need to be considered when developing inclusive policies.

Sunday has a "League Action" focus aimed at applying lessons from Saturday to our Local and State League activities. Then we turn to 2020 and a discussion of celebrating the League's 100th anniversary.

GET INVOLVED IN DISCUSSIONS OF MAINE'S EXPERIENCE WITH CITIZEN INITIATED LEGISLATION

Members of LWVME study committee visiting LWVMA Hamilton-Wenham Chapter to observe their CI Study Consensus Meeting on Feb 5, 2019



Most of you received a message from the LWVME Citizen Initiative (CI) Study Committee on January 17th. The message described the scope of the state-wide study and asked you to help the State Study Committee assess your interest and involvement in citizen's initiatives. The State Study Committee will send out periodic progress reports between now and June/July, when the Committee hopes to have a full set of study materials and consensus questions ready for local

unit consensus meetings. For those of you new to the League, the CI consensus meetings will assess member views on the types of advocacy the LWVME should undertake when legislation is proposed to change Maine's CI laws.

In an effort to help LWVPA members prepare for these consensus meetings and to ensure broad participation, the Portland Area Board would like to start an informal CI study group. The plan is to get together once a month to build and share CI knowledge among participants in advance of the consensus meetings. We would use the meetings to discuss the League study process, review readings recommended by the Study Committee (including draft sections of their report when available) and become better informed on the general topic before the consensus meetings. During the recent past, the LWVME has been involved in CI campaigns to promote Clean Elections and Ranked–Choice Voting, so developing a position to guide League advocacy on this topic would be of interest to all of you who care about these issues. Please email Peg Balano if you would like to join this CI Study Group. Once we get an idea about interest, we will work on a location and schedule.

MAINE CITIZENS FOR CLEAN ELECTIONS / TRANSPARENCY PORTLAND MEETING

Transparency Portland supported Question 2 on the Portland Municipal ballot during the last election, calling for greater disclosure of donor funding in city elections. They continue to meet and invite those interested in money in politics and democracy issues on the local level to join them. Next meeting is Tuesday, February 19th at 7 pm at the LWVME/MCCE office.

VOTER REGISTRATION UPDATE



Our first Naturalization Ceremony this year was at the King Middle School in Portland on January 18, where 46 new citizens were welcomed from 31 countries. We registered 24 new voters following their ceremony. The guest speaker was our new Governor, Janet Mills.
