Join us on May 19th for the 2nd Primary Study Consensus Meeting

LWVPA Primary Study enthusiasts met on April 28th to learn about the evolution of Maine's legislation for selecting Presidential Candidates and how Maine differs from other states, and to come to consensus on questions about proposals under consideration for improving the system. The discussion was both lively and informative, with two members of the LWVME Study Committee contributing the expertise gained by them during the study process.

The second Consensus Meeting is scheduled for Saturday, May 19th, 9 AM to noon. <u>No need to have participated in the first meeting to join us for the</u> <u>second</u>, which will focus on the pros/cons of (1) expanding the franchise for all primary elections (now generally restricted to party members only) and (2) moving from partisan to nonpartisan primaries. Here is your chance to have a say in how the LWVME advocates on these election issues. Don't sit back and let policies be formed by just a few members—we seek policy positions that reflect the membership in general! It is best if you can look at the <u>Primary Study</u> <u>Guide</u> before the meeting (especially pages 16+). The discussion leaders will be summarizing the findings, so don't let a lack of time to review materials in advance keep you from joining us on the 19th.

Volunteer Spotlight Sanford HS Voter Registration Drive

On Monday, April 30th, two members from the League of Women Voters held their 10th voter registration drive in southern Maine this spring, at Sanford High School in Sanford, Maine. What Donna Ricci and I found unique about this drive was the enthusiasm and preparation for the event set by social studies teacher, Paul Auger. Although many high schools in southern Maine have graciously allowed us to hold drives on their campuses, Paul's enthusiastic involvement with the drive was unique.

Prior to the League's arrival on campus, Paul had used his class to educate his seniors about the importance of registering and voting. He told his students registering to vote was an important adult rite of passage and that voting was their civic duty. After Donna and I arrived at the school, he gathered the seniors together in the dining room, and following a brief lecture about the checkered history of voting rights in this country, helped us pass out voter registration cards and supervised as students filled them out. Thanks to Paul's careful groundwork, Donna and I registered our highest number yet, 70 students!

It was such a pleasure for Donna and me, as representatives of the League, to feel that Sanford High School was as excited as we were to register students. Thank you to Sanford High School for your warm welcome and to their wonderful teacher, Paul Auger who helped guide his students through this important rite of passage.
