

When is Election Day?

Tuesday, November 3, 2015 is Election Day.

Polls are open 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.



Who Can Vote?

You must first register to vote. You can register to vote in Maine if:

- You are age 17 or older (You must be 18 by Election Day to vote).
- You are a citizen of the United States.
- You live in Maine.



Why Vote?



Why Vote?

You can help make important changes in the way your city, state, and country are run. This year is a mayoral and referendum election in Portland, as well as a referendum election for the state of Maine.

On Election Day, November 3rd, 2015, Portland voters will vote for:

- Mayor
- City Council, School Board, and Water District
- Local referendum questions on minimum wage and scenic overview
- Statewide ballot and bond questions, including a citizen initiative

Information about the City Council, School Board, and Water District races and the referendum questions are not included in this guide.

Yes, your vote is private. No one will know how you vote unless you tell them.



Why Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)?



RCV and the Mayoral Election

Portland voters will use Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) for the second time to choose a mayor. RCV is a way to vote for more than one candidate, choosing a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choice, and so on.



Why use RCV?

- More than two candidates are running for one office.
- Gives voters a chance to rank all the candidates by their 1st choice, 2nd choice, 3rd choice, and so on.
- Allows for the possibility of a compromise candidate.
- Helps elect a candidate a majority of voters like the best.
- · Eliminates need for a runoff election.

CAUTION! You can bring this sample ballot into the voting booth. If you do bring it with you, **make** sure to remove it from the booth when you leave.



Your Mayoral Ballot



Rank your Mayoral Candidate Choices

- Select your favorite candidate and mark as your 1st Choice.
- Select your second favorite candidate and mark as your 2nd Choice.
- · Select your third favorite candidate and mark as your 3rd Choice.
- Continue ranking candidates until you have voted for as many candidates as you want.
- The more candidates you rank, the greater the chance that your vote will count for one of the candidates in the final round.
- Remember that your choices for other candidates never count against the vote for your first choice candidate.



What to keep in mind when filling out the ballot

- · Rank only one candidate as your first choice.
- Rank different candidates as your 2nd and 3rd choices.
- Fill in ONLY ONE oval per row or column.
- If you make a mistake, see an election clerk to get a new ballot.



Why is the political party of the candidates not listed in the guide?

- All City of Portland races are nonpartisan. The political parties for candidates are not listed on the ballot.
- Visit the candidates websites or call their campaign offices to find out the political party afilliation.



About Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)



The Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) Process

STEP 1: Voters select their *1st choice, 2nd choice, 3rd choice,* and so on.

STEP 2: Municipal officials count all ballots.

Did someone get 50%+ 1 of the first choice votes?

Yes--they win! **No**--go to Step 3:

STEP 3: Last place candidate is removed.

STEP 4: All voters who ranked the removed candidate as their first choice will have their vote added to the totals of their second choice candidate. A computer recalculates the votes automatically.




Who Wins?

The winning candidate is the one who receives the majority of support (50% + 1) in the final round of counting.




About Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)


STEP 1: Voters rank their chioces




STEP 2: Ballots are counted



STEP 3: Last place candidate is removed. STEP 4: Votes are recalculated







WHO WINS? Candidate A wins with 52% of the votes.



Questions About Your Ballot



How Do I Get an Absentee Ballot?

- Ask for an absentee ballot from your city or town hall.
- Request an absentee ballot online from the Division of Elections at: http://www.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/AbsenteeBallot/index.pl
- · You can also ask for an absentee ballot for an immediate family member.
- The city or town clerk's office will tell you who is considered an immediate family member.



What Do I Do with My Absentee Ballot?

- Fill out the ballot. Remember, you do not have to vote for every question. It is okay to leave questions blank.
- Mail or deliver your ballot to the city or your town clerk's office.

It must be received before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

The Portland Mayor

Term (years to serve): 4 years Salary: \$65,000

- Can serve up to two terms
- Is a member of the City Council
- Chairs City Council meetings
- · Acts as a leader of the city
- Helps change city policies
- Oversees hiring and removing the City Manager, City Clerk, and Corporation Counsel
- Provides advice to the City Manager
- Helps prepare city budgets and improvement plans
- Can veto budgets, which the council can override

To be Portland's Mayor you must be--

- 18 years old
- US Citizen
- Resident of Portland for at least 3 months.
